THE ZIDICHOV DYNASTY AND THE CHICAGO COMMUNITY

HORAV YEHOSHUA HESCHEL EICHENSTEIN zt"l

In 1922, HoRav Yehoshua Heschel Eichenstein came to Chicago to raise funds for the decimated Galitzianer communities of which he was Rebbe — Zidichov and Chodorov. Inspired by his passion and his unique brand of Torah, Avodah and gemilas chasodim, the community begged him to stay. The Rav and Rebbetzin made the unprecedented decision to move from Galitzia to America.

For the people of the West Side, the Rebbe was a connection to the old world. He was fueled by a deep sense of achrayus and his mantra: "yenem's gashmiyus iz dein ruchniyus" — "another's physical needs are your spiritual needs." Just four years later, the Rebbe built the prominent shul on Turner and North Christiana Avenues, establishing the pillars of Torah, Avodah and Chesed on American soil.

In 1940, HoRav Yehoshua Heschel Eichenstein zt"l's life was tragically cut short and his eldest son, HoRav Avrohom Eichenstein, assumed the mantle of leadership.

Rav Avrohom was a tremendous talmid chochom who led by example. With complete commitment to Yiddishkeit, he gently drew balebatim to daven, learn Torah and get involved in chesed. Slowly, this transformed the entire community.

He was a pillar of warmth. He embodied אהבת ישראל and Together with his Rebbetzin, he followed in the ways of the Eichenstein family tradition and opened his home to all — broken individuals, Holocaust survivors, those with nowhere to stay. They were always there to respond with practical help, an eitzah, a brocha or a listening ear.

HORAV YEHOSHUA HESCHEL EICHENSTEIN SHLITA

In 1967 HoRav Yehoshua Heschel Eichenstein Shlita became Rebbe, and under his leadership, the empire of Torah, Tefila and Chesed flourished. The Rebbe had a dream to transform Chicago into a world-class city for Yiddishkeit. He believed every Yid could be "a shul Yid." Everyone could be connected. He became a rebbi in the Skokie Yeshiva and a beloved mashpiah to Yidden of all backgrounds. It didn't matter what kind of yarmulka you wore — everyone was welcomed with an open heart.

The groundwork for many of today's most prominent initiatives was laid in those years: hachnosas orchim housing, around-the-clock learning, minyanim and the founding of The Chicago Center. His devotion and concern for the community's ever-changing needs, both in ruchniyus and in gashmiyus, have set the stage for a thriving Chicago today.
